Dear friends,

Muttville rescued more dogs in 2022 than in any year of its existence but one. That's the good news. The bad news: we had to. We stretched and stretched to meet unprecedented need.

You may have seen news stories about shelters so crowded that animals are three or four to a kennel built for one. Some shelters have had to resume euthanasia. Senior dogs are more at risk than they have been in years - a situation almost as dire as when Muttville was founded.

It's not just shelters that are struggling. So many people – and their friends, their survivors, their caregivers – reached out to us to help with a dog they could no longer care for. A caseworker told us a familiar story: her client is forced to surrender her dogs in order to find housing. But local shelters warned her the dogs would be euthanized. She'd rather be homeless, she said. Muttville was her last hope.

Because of you, we can say YES to these dogs and more dogs in danger. These are heartbreaking situations, but thanks to you, they turn into beautiful second chances.

And happy anniversary! In 2022 we celebrated our 15th year and our 10,000th dog. Thank you for loving the mutts!
