
Adoptions are soaring. How? Volunteers!

Muttville made another presentation to the Humane Society of the United States' Animal Care Expo, the largest international conference for animal welfare professionals. "Best session of the conference!" we're told!

We did dental work on 679 dogs.

We hosted 253 events, serving **5,436** people from the age of 1 to 104.

We have **547** active volunteers.
